Senior Pastor's Message



Dear Friends,

Like many of you, I watched all five episodes of The Bible on the History Channel. I struggled with it strongly at times both because it was not always true to the testimony of scripture and because it seemed to focus and accentuate the sex and violence in the biblical stories (not surprising considering the producer was Mark Burnett – who first brought us the reality series *Survivor*). Lisa got tired of me pointing out verbally when the script was not

accurate to the Bible and some of the series' numerous embellishments. I even disagreed with friends and family – who thought the shows were wonderful. Their contention was that at least people are being reached by the message of the Gospel. My concern was and remains that perhaps they were reached and touched, but their minds are now imprinted with a rendition of accounts that do not always represent the exact sequence and nature of events as they are portrayed in the Bible. That may cause issues when they later read the Bible for themselves, hear a sermon, etc. – which may contradict with what they saw on TV (because if it was on TV, it has to be true and accurate, right?). Still, I have to be honest and admit that the Bible, as a collection of sacred books, contradicts itself at times and there are conflicting versions of the sequence and nature of events in our scriptures as well. Not everything in the Bible can be understood and applied literally either. As I watched the final episode Sunday night with Lisa and my parents, I realized that despite creative scripting, etc. the series has done a remarkable job of making people think about Jesus and who he was and is to them. We celebrated a glorious Easter on the beach and in our sanctuary. We had record attendance, glorious music, celebrated the sacraments, and felt the presence of the Lord in powerful ways. Now, in the aftermath of Easter and the series on the History Channel, we all have to answer a basic question. C. S. Lewis is credited with first raising the question, "Do you believe Jesus was a liar, a lunatic, or The Lord?" He raised the issue as a way of sharpening the question: "Who is Jesus?" So, what do we believe about Jesus? Was he a liar when he said and did all of those things? Or was he a deranged lunatic who was mistaken in his teachings and proclamations? Or, was Jesus telling the truth, which means he is the Christ, the Messiah, and The Lord? Consider what it means to allow Jesus to be Lord of your life before you answer. I know my answer. It is summed up in the earliest of all Christian affirmations: Jesus is Lord. Pastor Bill

As you know, our Youth Group went to the Florida Conference UCC Annual Peace River Camping and Canoeing Retreat the first weekend in March, and a good time was had by all -- everyone, that is, except for Trey and Van Thompson who were at home dealing with a very different side of Life's spectrum -- that of bereavement over the loss of their beloved Grandmother, Shelby Thompson. Both boys showed amazing strength throughout this experience which surely brought them to a deeper level of spiritual awareness, and which helped lead them to showing no evidence whatsoever of feeling "cheated" in any way over not being able to go camping. I have to say that **their** God Moment of understanding priorities and what is "right" became a real God Moment for me. Thank you, Trey and Van.

Then there's Tracy -- life-long friend of Joey, and who loved Shelby like a second Mom. He was torn between not going on the campout so he could be by Joey's side as he laid his Mom to rest, or going on the campout so the remaining boys looking forward to going on that trip would not have to drop out. At least three people came to Tracy's rescue on this dilemma by saying to him that Shelby would want for him to go on the campout -- that Tracy's ministry is working with the Youth. I can whole-heartedly vouch for that, and I thank God for the blessing of Tracy and his joyful ministry to the Youth of POUCC.

Through adversity, I have no doubt that Trey, Van and Tracy learned to see, love and follow our Risen Savior more clearly, dearly and nearly day by day this past month. ALLELUIA! Christ is Risen, and He lives in us all and through us all in our day-by-day lives! HAPPY EASTER!

THE GIFT AND THRIFT STORE



GIFT AND THRIFT STORE TIDBITS

As most of you know, one of the missions of our thrift store is the transport of items to the Farm Workers Association Office in Pierson (40 miles from here on route 17). Trips are made several times a month with a carload of clothing and other useful items for the farm workers. The last day of February the trip included warm clothing, blankets/comforters, dishes, shoes and other items. These are items that are a little too tired for our store but still have plenty of life in them.

A phone call is made to Marcos Crisanto, the man in charge, and a day and time for delivery is scheduled. He, or volunteer Pedro, gives a welcome hug and then everyone gets busy and unloads the car. The trip up and back is less than two hours. Usually Thursday around noon is the selected day and distribution begins that afternoon and on Friday afternoons each week.

This past Christmas, 250 children received a gift from donations received from our store. Jackie Gaither had crocheted and knitted scarves and hats. Stuffed animals that had tears and/or were soiled were repaired and washed for the children. Dolls with unruly hair and undressed were dressed and hair tamed for the girls. Toy cars and horses were sent for the boys. Books and games for older children were also sent. Jewelry that didn't sell after many months in the store was also taken up to be used as gifts.

As mentioned previously, keep your donations coming. Also remember that all items (except electronics, TV's, and large furniture) are welcome including jewelry—don't forget to include lone earrings and broken pieces or those missing stones. Some of these are repairable or can be matched with another lone earring or made into a necklace.

It is very helpful to the volunteers if clothing is laundered and folded neatly in boxes or on hangers. Linens should be laundered as well and folded neatly. Kitchen items should also be washed before coming to the store. The volunteers give you a big thank you for that.

Year to date sales (up to 3/4/13) total \$5,297 which converts into average of us serving 110 customers a week. Respectfully submitted by *Harriet F. Rogers*.

The big event of the weekend was a 9 mile canoe trip (and kayak) down Peace River. This was an incredible experience for us all. Despite the cold we were able to enjoy the four hour trip. Some kids even swam...CRAZY! Our group had more sense. There was a sign on one of the trees as we went down the river, "The river is a gift from God." What a wonderful reminder of our Holy Creator and all that has been given to us to care for and enjoy.

Peace River is also known for its fossils. We ran into some fossil hunters during our canoe trip and were given the opportunity to search for fossils. Elijah was even able to bring some home.

At our closing worship service on Sunday morning, there were two youth that came forward asking for prayers and support. One young man's dad has been diagnosed with cancer and he is going through treatments. He asked for help to accept his dad's illness and whatever may unfold. Another young man came forward sharing that he suffers from depression and thoughts of suicide. There was not a dry eye in the place. It just goes to show you that the youth today have serious issues they deal with on an everyday basis. What an amazing opportunity to see the outpouring of love and support for these two young men.

It is such pleasure a to see our young people join in with others of faith. The best part is to see the kids faces light up every time they reunited with friends made on previous retreats. We have an amazing group of youth at the POUCC.

We are hopeful that by the end of the summer, Phase I of the building can be completed - which will be a 24 foot square concrete pad and a steel roof to create a Pavilion for use in worship, picnics, and other special events such as concerts and blessings for bikes and pets. DISASTER MANAGEMENT

TROPICAL STORM DEBBIE RECOVERY: Though nine months have passed since Tropical Storm Debbie caused severe flooding damage along the Northwestern part of Florida, the recovery work is only now ready to begin. In January of this year, World Renew, one of our ecumenical partners in disaster

ministry, visited the homes of those in Suwannee and Columbia Counties who might need help. They reported the following:

- 211 households in Columbia County need the help of volunteer workers and the estimated cost of the materials which will be needed in the recovery amount to \$4,695,296.
- 158 households in Suwannee County need help and the estimated material cost is \$4,190,978.

The Long Term Recovery Committees in both counties have received grants which have made it possible for them to employ construction supervisors to work with groups of volunteers. Florida Conference churches are encouraged to consider organizing a group of volunteers to assist one of these families. The recovery work in these two counties will continue for many months. Contact Pastor Bill if interested.


