PASTOR'S THOUGHTS



• Our congregation is a small part of the greater Christian church and all the vast history which goes with it. There are so many symbols used in churches and worship. Examples would be: Bread - the body of Christ; Wine - the blood of Christ; Water - we are cleansed in Christ The Alter candles; The Epistle (on the right) - represents the New Testament Letters The Gospel (on the left) - represents the Good News.

Candles always remind us of Jesus, the light of the world, and of those dangerous days when Christians had to hide in secret to worship and share the Holy Communion. Speaking of the alter candles, the light of Christ is carried in by an acolyte to light the alter candles. This represents Christ (the light) being present with us during the worship of our God. At the end of worship, I would like the acolyte to carry the light of Christ back out of the sanctuary into world for us to follow (follow Christ, to be his hands in this world).

- I'd like to share a brief history of a Paschal Candle in the Christian church.
 - Currently, the large candle by the communion table is being called the Christ candle. The Christ candle is the candle used during the seasons of Advent and Christmas. It is the large, white candle in the center of the Advent wreath. This candle is lit on Christmas Eve (the beginning of the Christmas season) and lit during the following Sunday(s) during the Christmas season.
 - The paschal candle is an ancient symbol of the risen Jesus and commonly used during the Great Fifty Days of Easter. The Paschal Candle is the first light of Easter that leads the faithful into the darkened church. It is a very large white candle, the largest and tallest of all sanctuary candles. The Paschal Candle remains lit for all the season of Easter, through Ascension Thursday to Pentecost. After that, it is removed from its place next to the Gospel side of the altar and placed near the baptismal font. During the rest of the year, it is lighted at baptisms to remind Christians how in baptism we are crucified and raised with Jesus (Romans 6:3-5). The paschal candle is lighted at Christian funerals as a reminder that those who die in Christ are raised up with Him. This candle is also lit each time a new member is brought into the church.
- Please inform Kathy Shaffner or Pastor Glenn of anyone who will be graduating (high school, college, grad school) this spring.

DEACON'S CORNER

Deacons

The Deacons urge everyone to display their name tags during services and various Church functions. The name tags will help Pastor Rice more quickly put names and faces together. We are also experiencing a growth of new people joining us in worship and Church functions. This will help them getting to know each of us better.

At the March Deacons meeting, after a lengthy discussion, it was decided that the hanging "decorations" would be displayed during the Easter season, Pentecost, reformation Sunday, Christmas eve and the following two Sundays. The hangings may also be displayed on other special occasions. The discussion has been centered around the "decorations" hanging above the congregation, not the banners behind the alter. To some, they were purely decorations, to others they represented liturgical colors.

The use of colors to differentiate liturgical seasons became a common practice in the Western church in about the fourth century. The Lutheran and Anglican churches that emerged from the reformation retained the traditional colors but they gradually disappeared entirely from the worship of the Reformed churches. During the 20th century, the ecumenical Liturgical Movement prompted the rediscovery of the old Christian ritual – including the traditional colors of the Western churches. The Season and corresponding colors are Advent-Blue, Christmas-White, Epiphany-Green, Lent-Purple, Easter-White, Pentecost-Red, Season after Pentecost-Green.

Briefly, the colors express emotions and ideas that are associated with each season or holiday. Congregations in the United Church of Christ have the freedom to use any combination of colors or no particular color at all. We, at Port Orange United Church of Christ, will be utilizing the colors for special occasions. Respectfully, *Charlie Baskin, Deacon's Secretary*
