MODERATOR'S MESSAGE

Well, it is now March 2023 and we are in the Lenten Season that started February 22nd and will end April 8th. This is the Christian traditional time for <u>Fasting</u>, <u>Praying and</u> <u>Almsgiving</u>. <u>Almsgiving</u>? This is not a word you hear very much, if at all during the normal course of day-to-day life. <u>Almsgiving</u> is defined as "the practice of giving money or food to poor people". It is considered "an act of virtue or

charity" and is a widespread practice in different forms of religions worldwide. Keeping with the thought of "Giving", what exactly is "Giving" vs. "Almsgiving"? Are donations a form of Almsgiving? We all make donations. Ruth and I often comment to each other about the many letters we receive almost daily asking for money. Giving to the Native American needy in New Mexico or Oregon, seems to open the door to giving to Native American all over the Country. Or, giving to one Veteran's organization seems to open the door to every other Veteran's group. Giving to help students in need leads to being asked to help all students. Giving to help feed the poor in Ukraine opens the door to helping the poor everywhere, or so it seems. It seems like giving in general is like turning on a neon sign that states..."Giving done here!". Where does "Almsgiving" begin and "Giving" end? I am not asking this question to discourage anyone from giving to any cause. On the contrary, I believe giving opens a portion of our heart and psyche that is very healthy to our soul, mind and spirit. Giving is a way to share something with someone else. Perhaps we have too much and want to share. Or, perhaps we have very little but recognize that someone needs the little we have more than we do. It does not matter what we give or how much we give. What matters is how we feel when we give and how we feel in our hearts about helping someone else. Now, back to *Almsgiving* because that is a part of the Lenten Season. OPERATIONS & FINANCE TEAM



So here we are approaching late spring in Florida. Is it not crazy? Seems we were just celebrating the birth of our Savior and here were are approaching Easter. Late last fall we found evidence of roof leaks in the kitchen. Stained ceiling tiles led to inspection of the underside of the roof sheathing and we found damage that required repair. Seeing the Kitchen HVAC unit had failed and appeared to be partially responsible for the leaks, we removed the HVAC unit, removed and replaced the deteriorated sheathing (plywood), flashed and counter flashed around the make-up air and exhaust fan units on the roof and installed new architectural shingles to match the existing ones. Stained

ceiling tiles were replaced with new tiles. Thus far we have not seen any new leaks. The shed roof behind the back of the church is leaking and is being attended to. The Church Council decided to place the A/C replacement project on hold. The HVAC contractor was contacted and informed us we should be able to get a "few" more year out of the system. A new fence around the existing HVAC system will be installed soon. We have observed children accessing the church proper roof on the west side of the building. The Port Orange police have been notified and steps are being taken to stop this problem. Our pavement sealing company continues to re-seal the paved surfaces that deteriorated rapidly. The sidewalks are in need of power washing. Do any members have a power wash machine they can provide to accomplish this mission? We are pleased to see Pastor Pat and Alan's plans have changed and she will be resuming her position as our Pastor. We are very thankful Pastor Dunlap has been available and has done a great job providing in depth sermons. we look forward to he and Wayne keeping in touch with our Church. Until we see each other again, God bless. *Art Horton, Chairman*


